on financial discipline by pegging the fiscal deficit for the next three years at 3 per cent. Stating firmly that ours is a tax noncompliant society, it seeks to widen tax collection, while giving some relief to the lower end of the salaried classes. The reduction in tax for small-scale units is a welcome move, as this sector has been adversely affected by demonetisation. The Budget makes a symbolic but bold move to bring in more transparency to electoral funding.
